

## Suggestions for Fulfilling the Special Requirement in the Department of Advertising and Public Relations

**Note for students under the 2004-06 and earlier catalogs:** Remember that the 12 hours of the special requirement must be satisfied with any 300- and 400-level courses in A&S, COM, and/or C&BA. You may not use 300- or 400-level courses from your minor area to satisfy the 12-hour special requirement. You are limited to six hours in C&BA for the special requirement, but if your minor is general business or business administration, you cannot use any C&BA courses in the special requirement. To register for C&BA courses, you must request a permit to add the course as a special requirement in 10 Bidgood Hall. Students with double majors or double minors may use 300- and 400-level courses in the second major or minor to satisfy the special requirement. Having two minors requires that one be in A&S. **Note for students under the 2006-08 catalog:** Remember that the 12 hours of the special requirement must be taken at the 300 or 400 level in any areas of study outside of APR, JN, MC, TCF and your minor. A&S and COM courses are recommended to help ensure the 65-hour requirement in liberal arts needed for the degree. (The list of courses below will not be comprehensive for students under the 2006-08 catalog, since it only covers A&S, COM, and C&BA courses.) To register for C&BA courses, you must request a permit to add the course as a special requirement in 10 Bidgood Hall. Students with double majors or double minors may use 300- and 400-level courses in the second major or minor to satisfy the special requirement. Having two minors requires that one be in A&S.
